Featured Member: Jack Roderick

Long-time member, former Director, and active volunteer, Jack Roderick graduated from Penn State University's Naval Reserve Officer's Training Corps program in 1956 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Engineering and commission as Ensign, United States Navy. Assigned to NAS Pensacola as a Student Naval Aviator, Jack completed the multi-engine program and won his wings of gold in March 1958.

Assigned to VW-2 (Early Warning) at NAS Patuxent River, Maryland, Jack flew the WV-2 radar-equipped Lockheed Constellation while supporting the 2nd Fleet (Atlantic) and 6th Fleet in the Mediterranean. Jack's second tour was with WV-2 airborne early warning training unit, also at Patuxent River. Serving as an instructor pilot, he also flew operational missions.



Jack's next assignments included the Navy's Advanced Engineering Course at the Naval Postgraduate School, and Safety Officer & Accident Investigation School at the University of Southern California. He resumed flying duties in the Martin P5M "Marlin" at NAS North Island, CA, NAS Sangley Point, Philippines, and Cam Rahn Bay, Republic of Vietnam. In 1966, he was

assigned to NAS Sangley Point as base safety officer and assistant operations officer. His flying duties included flying the R4D (C47) and R5D (C54) transports throughout Southeast Asia, including Vietnam.

Jack transitioned from the Navy as a Lieutenant Commander in 1968 and joined United Airlines as a pilot. After 32 years with United, he retired as a Senior Captain on the Boeing 737, May 2000, completing a remarkable aviation career.

Republic F-105D "Thunderchief" SN 61-0099

The Museum's "Thud" was constructed by Republic Aviation Corporation in Farmingdale, New York as an F-105D-15-RE "Thunderchief". Completed in 1962, the US Air Force accepted on 9 February 1962.

March 1962 the ship was transferred to the 8th Tactical Fighter Squadron (TFS), 49th Tactical Fighter Wing (TFW), based at Spangdahlem Air Base, Germany. For nearly four years, it served on the front lines of the Cold War as a highspeed, low-altitude penetration bomber, capable of carrying a single nuclear weapon in its internal bomb bay.

Our "Thud" returned to the US in December 1967 for duty with the 4520th Combat Crew Training Wing, Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada. The ship was used to train pilots for combat tours in Vietnam.

In 1972, the aircraft was transferred to the Air Force Reserve, serving with the 305th TFS, 507th TFW and later, with the 466th TFS, 419th TFW, based at Hill Air Force Base, Utah. After accumulating 4,532 hours of flight time, she served her

last years as a platform for battle damage repair training.

In July 1984, our Thud was honorably struck from Air Force rolls and transferred to the National



Museum of the US Air Force loan program. In April 1985, she was loaned to the City of Aurora, IL and after several years on display, transferred to Air Classics Museum, September 1997.
